





Bringing National Japanese Television to the FIFA Women's World Cup

otos were taken of the National Japanese Television (NHK) broadcasting equipment from Japan to Canada for the FIFA 2015 Women's World Cup.

Sensitive broadcasting equipment needs special care. For Nippon Hoso Kyokai (Japanese Broadcasting Corporation), we successfully delivered more than 15 tons of equipment by air and ocean, including setup, ready for the direct broadcast of the FIFA 2015 Women's World Cup.

Direct broadcasts are time-sensitive. Therefore, all equipment needed to arrive intact. Thus, everything had to follow the exact schedule for NHK to be ready for direct broadcast at the World Cup

With no room for deviations, we arranged the delivery end-to-end. From packing and crating in Japan to warehousing for all the equipment in Canada, transportation and finally, setting up the NHK "camp" at Vancouver, Edmonton and Winnipeg stadiums. The total shipment consisted of a broadcasting Van and two 20' containers (SOCs) by RORO Vessel, and about 15 tons of airfreight.

24/7 logistics service during the entire tournament

For two months, our staff was on standby in Canada to assist NHK 24/7 with supervising and ensuring everything worked as planned. At first, the broadcasting camp was set up at Winnipeg Stadium to cover two matches on June 8. Then, it was taken down and moved to Vancouver by June 12 to cover another five matches, afterwards to Edmonton by June 27 to cover 16 games and finally back to Vancouver by July 5 to cover the finals between USA and Japan.

"It is genuinely logistics in top gear, as the time between each match is short and the distance between each venue is far, says Henrik Irmov, Managing Director of Scan Global Logistics in Japan.

Next stop - New York

Right after the final whistle of the final match between the USA and Japan, where the USA came out as champions, and all interviews with players were done, all equipment was repacked. Part of the equipment was returned to Japan by air. The rest, the broadcasting van, one container and other equipment, was transported approximately 4800 kilometres by truck from Vancouver to New York, where our next mission with the NHK began - this time covering the MLB baseball opening games at Yankee Stadium!

NHK, Nippon Hoso Kyokai (Japan Broadcasting Corporation), is Japan's only public broadcaster. As a public broadcaster funded by fees received from TV viewers, NHK delivers a wide range of impartial, highquality programs, both at home and abroad. NHK was founded in 1926 after a merger between three broadcasting stations. Domestically, the corporation consists of two terrestrial channels, two satellite channels and three radio stations. Internationally, two television services, one English and one Japanese and one radio station in 18 different languages.
